It would cost \$1 million annually to remove the 12,000 tons or 24 million pounds of trash that is illegally dumped on vacant properties in and around Flint neighborhoods each year.

When owners abandon properties and stop maintenance, the local community is left with the blight that follows. The City of Flint is working to hold property owners accountable and remove blight. The Land Bank is investing \$1 million in mowing all vacant properties in Flint at least once this year, two-thirds of which it does not own. However, the local government cannot eliminate blight in Flint alone. It would cost \$7 million annually to mow the grass and remove the trash from all vacant properties in Flint, once a month from spring to summer. Thus, many Flint residents are stepping-up and mowing vacant properties next-door, across the street, and down the block.

It would cost \$7 million annually to mow the grass and remove the trash from all vacant properties in Flint, once a month from spring to summer. Thus, many Flint residents are stepping-up by organizing neighborhood clean-ups and maintaining vacant properties in their neighborhoods.
